

Presentation- Multi-axis Design- Barbara Dill by Gordon Andrews

At the May meeting Barbara Dill shared with attendees some of her vast knowledge and experience with multi-axis turning.

As background she revealed that she was inspired to explore this type of turning when she attended at a demo given by Mark Sfirri in 2006; his creations piqued her interest. She also suggested that in her opinion one of the most important aspects is to think about creating a design before starting a project.

Barbara cautioned the group about several safety aspects most importantly to consider how a design must be planned so that the removed material does not severely weaken the structural integrity of the piece. Unlike a single axis turning multi-axis turning does not allow the piece to always transmit pressure in a straight line. When the piece is compressed between the headstock and the tailstock a fine balance between pressure to properly hold the piece and the pressure the piece can resist. Special care must also be taken when an axis is near the edge of a piece. Needless to say, she also stressed the importance of using safety devices such as a face shield.

Barbara demonstrated her techniques by turning both parallel and twisted axis examples. Her demo was presented so that both novices and long time turners could learn some of the techniques she has learned and invented.

She started by turning a spindle with one axis to show that the primary factors are the axis and the profile...the outcome is always circular. She then turned an example using parallel axes and explained the cove/lens form which resulted. Unfortunately, her experience made it look easy to create an artistic form but no doubt her workshop has seen many experiments that have taught her a great deal.

She explained some of the variables involved in the way she lays out her axis points on the stock ends. One technique that has made her work easier is that she has devised a numbering system for each axis point (on each end) that she has made SOP. No doubt a good labeling method lessens the number of mistakes. **[Continued on page2]**

Her next examples showed the way a twisted axis produces interesting effects. While the demo progressed samples of the various methods were passed through the audience.

In addition to turning techniques she also mentioned a few “shop techniques” that make her work easier. Many of us find simple technique to make our work easier. Many of us might turn a piece that needs to fit into another piece. She made a sample board with different size holes bored and marked with their size. She can find which size hole gives a tight fit and know what size drill to use. It’s a simple technique and I’ve used something similar for sizing holes for bolts etc but Barbara uses her in her projects.

The demonstration finished with examples of a “split” turning that she had previously made, a mention of her web site and articles she has published in the AAW magazine. She also provided a handout that showed how she organizes her thinking about multi-axis turning.



David is a great teacher. If you missed this opportunity, shame on you. He uses just 4 cuts during the whole demo: Roughing cut with the tool parallel to the lathe bed, Slicing cut with the tool at a 20-30° angle to the lathe bed, a Scraping cut with the upper edge of the tool doing the cutting and a Sheer scraping cut with a fresh burr to finish up a project. David's favorite tool is the bowl gouge. He used a drive center made by Bill Rubenstein with Stubby Lathe Co. (www.stubbylatheusa.com) for his between the center turnings and a 4 jaw chuck with the biggest jaws it would hold for bowls. David likes the big jaws because it gives him more choices as to foot shape later. More helpful hints: Don't use CA glue on wet wood; stay away from checks in rings; jaws touch the bowl not the chuck bottom & hollowing is cut ,clean , measure, do it all again.

His demos followed his DVDs very closely so if you would like more.....
