Chainsaw Turning With Tom Lowe

Tom Lowe is a local wood carver who's originally from Martha's Vineyard (or Fantasy Island, as he calls it) & who carves bowls for a living. Tom took us through the process he has established. First he shapes the outside of his bowls. He uses a carver's screw, drilled into the top of the bowl, to hold it down, bottom up. He starts shaping the outside, using a Bosch angle grinder with a double chain-saw wheel. The double is much better than a single, he argues; it reduces kick-back 80%. Still, it's a dangerous tool and he advised caution when using it. In a few dusty moments the outside was rough-shaped. He then switched over to another angle-grinder with a doughnut-shaped rasp-wheel. Not as rough as the chain saw attachment, it leaves a finer surface while still removing a lot of wood. His third step was a drill sander. Tom sands up to about 300 grit. With special wood he'll at times go from 300 to 600, in one jump, to create a glassy surface. Tom then reverses the bowl. He normally clamps it down in a 2x4 frame (which he had forgotten to bring) and repeats the process, from chainsaw wheel to [Demo, page2]

Pen Turners News Bruce gave the demo on his method of making baseball bat pens. Drill a stepped hole in the blank on the lathe. Glue in the brass tube, mount a 1/4" long bolt into your chuck, screw the blank onto the bolt & turn the bat. Drill a hole in a hardwood blank for the pen refill. Turn a nib shape with a small tenon. Fit to the bat. Insert the pen refill. Drill more if needed. Cut off a small piece of spring and insert into bottom of pen body. Press fit the nib. With decal paper for your printer, make a few baseball decals and add them to the bat. Seal with CA glue.

January is the next meeting. Bring a fountain pen for discussion.

[Demo] sander. One interesting tidbit had to do with his finishing oil. Tom uses mineral oil, which he buys from Walmart's pharmacy (it's a laxative & completely food-safe). A pint costs \$1,50, cheaper than when you buy it in bulk. Tom saturates his bowls in mineral oil the minute they're finished to keep them from cracking. He will apply mineral oil up to three times a day for three days, being careful to wipe off the excess towards the end of the process. Tom showed some of his pieces. He uses a Bosch die-grinder and various smaller versions of his big tools and sanders to create grooves and overhangs. Everybody seemed to stick around to the end of what was a very interesting demonstration. To anybody interested in off-lathe enhancements of their turnings this was very useful information. Those of you who were here for Charles Ferrar's demo two-three years ago would have noticed that he uses many of the same rim-enhancement techniques that Tom does. You'll see Tom every Saturday at the Farmer's Market in Richmond, or at local craft shows.
