Speaking of Embellishments, today I made a few tool handles with friction burned lines by request of a neighbor. I know that many of us use wire to add the fine burned lines. It can be dangerous if the wire gets hot or catches your fingers. Then I considered a potentially better way... if the wire were mounted on a handle with a convex or dado area below the wire, or mounted on a bowed tension stick as is the strap sander I use for some contoured work that isn't turned. I like the notion that it would keep my fingers away from the wire or heaven forbid, be tempted again to wrap the wire around my fingers. To take that pondered concept just a bit further, another somewhat similar tool that can be made, would add a cotton string in lieu of wire that can be changed out to make very fine colored lines. It could be used to add silver, gold gilding, paint or colored waxes. My only thought there would be the problem of any further finishing solvents that might cause the colors below to dissolve or run. Perhaps a wash coat of white shellac between the

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different materials might solve that problem as shellac is compatible with many other finishes and keeps the incompatible materials from reacting together.

Yes . . . I think it's fair to say that last weekend's expo kick started my desire to think out of the box and to try new things, as I'm sure it did for many other folks who had the opportunity to attend and to see some great woodturning "magic" at its best.






