October Meeting Notes

The October meeting was held jointly with Tidewater Turners and was a two-part remote demonstration of how to make a basket illusion bowl. Harvey Meyer provided handouts and step by step instructions as he went through the process over two sessions for about 3½ hours of demonstrations. A video is available to members who wish to review it. Even if you don't embark on the time-consuming process of making a complete basket illusion, there is useful information about bead forming, coloring, indexing, woodburning, and tools, not to mention wood turning techniques.

Future Demonstrations

From David Bushman:

November - Ron Campbell with AXE carbide tools is scheduled to do an interesting demo of his carbide tools. Ron will present a video demonstration where he makes a beautiful open form from a piece of wood that you would consider to be scrap. After viewing this you will think twice before you dispose of scrap wood.

December – Christmas Party?? Let's hope we get through this current COVID wave and things are back to normal before then.

Note: David Bushman's term ends in December but he plans to have two demos lined up so his replacement doesn't have a panic attack trying to get a demo ready for January. He has some good ideas for this that will be interesting and enjoyable.

EDITOR'S NOTE

As discussed at the last board meeting, demonstrations need not be an hour and a half and produce a finished product. The purpose of a meeting demonstration is to promote interest, improve a skill, inspire a new idea, and otherwise fulfill the club's mission. (See the mission statement.)

Therefore, the board hopes to feature more member participation in club demonstrations next year. Perhaps you have new tool to show off? Maybe someone will step up to moderate a discussion. Or a hands-on demo of gouge techniques? What about a club sharpening session? Woodburning as an embellishment? We may have more meetings with multiple lathes doing the same thing or all doing different things. We need someone to coordinate and schedule such events. If you have some communication skills and want to contribute to the club, you can be the next First Vice President.

Urns by Peggy Andrews. She needs some help – see "News of Note".

From Cody Walker:



Ash, colored with trans tint and finished with wipe on poly, approximately 8.5" in diameter.

From Ron Bishop:



Maple - lost wood technique. 10" x 5" blue dye, white latex paint and semi-gloss lacquer.

More from Ron Bishop:



Cherry and Cocobolo. It is 11" high x 5" diameter and finished with Liberon Finishing Oil.



Made from walnut, using the Lost Wood Technique. About 7" x 4 ½". Finished with Liberon Finishing Oil and buffed with the Beale buffing system

From Ray Deyo:



Salad serving set for six, with two nut cups. White Birch.

From Royal Wood: Magnolia with a shellac finish, 7" dia. x 3 1/4" high.



More from Royal Wood:



Swamp oak, 6" dia. x 3", finished with sanding sealer.

From Steve Kellner:



Spalted Sycamore vase, 7" x 14" tall, 1/8" wall, with a gloss lacquer finish. He has not decided how to deal with the split: leave it or lace it.? Since the split is on the less interesting side, he may just leave it and let it face the wall.

From Bob Marchese:





Eastern Red Cedar, 8" x 3.75".

From Bob Silkensen:



14" Maple Basket Illusion. Bob says he was already working on this when we had the demo by Harvey Meyer, but the next one will use some of his ideas.

From Jerry Fisher:



The mallet head is hard maple and the handle is Mesquite that a friend sent me from Texas. The maple has a more interesting story behind it.

From Jim Zorn:



This is Jim's attempt to imitate a segmented "dizzy" bowl, using a pattern of acrylic paint dots. It is 8" in diameter.

From Barbara Dill:



The ball can spin around in a bowl on the top of the multi-axis base. See the email which distributed the

newsletter for a copy of a short video that demonstrates this sculptural piece in action.

From John Daniel:





The white bowl is holly, with a wipe on poly and wax finish.



The purple heart bowl is finished in walnut oil, with top finish of wax.

From Brad Miller:



These are Christmas decorations: The globe is maple with walnut finials. The globes are hollowed and finished with wipe on poly. He is planning to make about 30 units for family and friends. The height is 6.5" and diameter is 2.5".

From Chris Waggener:





Chris says this is a small 5" tall, flat sided oval vase and thinks it's mahogany. He got it out of the scrap bin at Woodcraft for a dollar. It's finished with Danish oil.

From David Bushman:



This is a white oak vessel that has been carved and textured with wood burning. The finish is wipe on poly.
