November Meeting

When the meeting convened at 6:30 p.m., there were 24 persons present and 4 attending by Zoom.

Two new members, Jerry Pugh and his spouse, and Lewis Ladocsi were recognized. There was one visitor.

Larry Yancey announced that a year-end wood raffle would be conducted in the parking lot near Woodcraft on December 3, at 1:00 p.m. The rain date will be December 12.

Steve Kellner asked for suggestions for Challenge ideas for next year. Several were offered from the floor and noted for action by the board of directors to select four.

Cody Walker announced that the pen turners group had contributed 34 pens to the Woodcraft "Turn for the Troops" program.

Elections were held for Board of Director positions. A quorum was present. The following positions were open of election:

There were no opposition candidates and all current officers agreed to serve again, except that Chuck Horton and Larry Yancey ran for each other's position. Also, Katherine Harris declined to serve again and that position remains open. The slate was accepted by acclimation and there were no "no" votes.

After the Show and Tell presentation, Bob Silkensen won the participation drawing.

November Program Review

Kirk DeHeer provided a remote demo via Zoom from Utah on the topic of tool sharpening. Some highlights of his presentation included:

- Have the grinder close to your lathe no more than 1 ½ steps. A 90 degree turn right or left is ideal.
- Never use hard grey grindstones on tool steel.
 CBN or friable white grindstones are ideal.
- Do not grind soft/mild steel on a CBN wheel. It is designed for use with hard tool steel.
- You need something like a 60-80 grit wheel for shaping and a finer grit (120-220) for sharpening.
 Opinions vary on how fine a wheel one really needs.
- He recommended a Wolverine style grinding jig to ensure a consistent sharpening process.
- Use a scraper to refine a curved surface a light touch is needed.

He spent a lot of time on skew sharpening and negative rake scrapers. There was good audience interaction with questions and answers.

Show and Tell/Favorite Turning of the Year

From David Bushman



This is his favorite turning of 2022. He sold it so he won't be able to bring it to the meeting. It is southern magnolia with ebony butterfly bodies.





This is Gonk (aka Norwegian gnome) ornament. It is 5 1/4" tall x 7" diameter and made from sweet gum, with a feed and wax finish. The gray faux fur covers the body.

From Brad Miller:



Christmas Ornament: Approximately 6" tall x 3 1/2" wide; made of sweet gum and pine, with a lacquer spray finish; made by Brad Miller.

From Steve Schwartz:



This is a cherry bowl with deer.



This is a cherry bowl with antelope and cattle

From Steve Kellner:



This is a calabash 7" high x 8" wide. It is spalted birch that I picked up at one of the wood raffles. One section was a little too punky and I should have reinforced it before final shaping. The result was a few sunken spots.

From Larry Yancey:



My hollow form is a piece of hackberry that I ebonized, then used model airplane paint blotched on with a paper towel and then a final coat of lacquer. The piece is about 4-1/2" wide and 2-3/4" tall. It has both turning and finishing issues, but was a good learning experience.

From John Daniel:



I turned the pumpkin from willow oak. The pumpkin was carved to get the "lumps." The top is walnut turned then carved. The pumpkin is finished with Watco Wipe On Poly (satin) and the top finished with Mahoney's Walnut Oil.

From Don Lutrell:



This is an "elongasphere" ornament. It is about $2'' \times 3-1/2''$ and made from holly.

From Chuck Horton:



These are the first six of a dozen planned snowman ornaments. Made from hard maple, sanded to 320 grit, with no finish. They are hollowed from the bottom and weigh about an ounce. They are about 3 ½" tall.

From Ron Bishop:



This is Ron's best of 2022. It is a cherry fluted vase, about 8" x 5". It is inished with Libron Finishing oil

From Katherine Harris:





The segmented bowl is from pallet wood.





The one with wood burned decoration is her first attempt at wood burning.

December Quarterly Challenge

4th Quarter: Hollow form, but not from the top. Hollow from the bottom, off-center or multi-axis.

From Ray Deyo:



This is

spalted beech; it is 11" wide and 16"tall.

From Cody Walker:



Olive oil jug, middle hollowed, spalted hickory, finished with teak oil, 4 1/2" dia. x 5" tall



Bottom hollowed wedding jug, made with poplar and finished with tung oil, 4" dia. x 6 1/2" tall.

From Steve Kellner:







Steve's challenge item is a multi-axis hollow-form vase, hollowed through the three $1\ 1/4"$ openings in the necks. It is willow oak, 12" high x 10" wide. It is finished with lacquer. He switched between the necks multiple times and ended up with a 1/2" -3/4" wall and a few bruises! There was lots of power carving and sanding to finish shaping the outside.

From Dan Lutrell:



This is "Trading Places", a multi axis hollow form in spalted red oak. 8" dia. x 14" tall. The finish is natural.

From Chuck Horton:



This is one of my hollow-from-the-bottom challenge pieces getting the bottom plug installed and before completing the top.



These are completed Bradford pear hollow forms, hollowed from the bottom. The left one is about 8'' tall and the right one is $6\frac{1}{2}''$. Both are from the same piece of wood. They are sanded to 400 grit; the finish is wipe on poly and Beal buffed.

From David Bushman:





These ornaments are hollowed from the bottom up. They are cherry with chechen finials and finished with spray lacquer.

From John Daniel:





This was turned from a very dry 12" round of walnut. It has a small throat and was hollowed from bottom up, with sides less than .25" thick. It is finished in Mahoney's Walnut Oil and buffed, with a micro crystalline wax final coat.
