Notes From PenTurners Meeting

The Richmond Penturners Club met on Jan. 12 and demonstrated, discussed, and compared various finishes for wooden pens. The finishes included French polish, Pens Plus, CA glue and Gluboost. There was also a discussion of finishing an aluminum pen with Birchwood Casey Aluminum Black.

January Program

Turnathon- We will have four live demonstrations going simultaneously. Attendees will be able to follow which ever topic they choose. The presenters and topics are as follows:

Ray Deyo – Ray will demonstrate how to make a captured ring using a store-bought tool and a homemade tool. After his demo you will have the opportunity to try to make your own captured ring. Steve Kellner – Steve will demonstrate his templating system for making Hawaiian style repairs. After his demo you will have the opportunity to try the system out yourselves. Chuck Horton – Chuck will demonstrate how he creates his Christmas snowman ornaments. There may also be some opportunities for hands on

David Bushman – David will demonstrate how to make threaded inserts for vessels and boxes out of PVC electrical conduit fittings and how to use them. Afterwards you will have the opportunity to create your own inserts.

Future Demonstrations

February – 2 x 4 turning marathon – We will set up as many lathes as possible and everyone in attendance will have the opportunity to create something. We will have an ample supply of 2 x 4 squares and 4 x 4 cubes along with some pieces suitable for spindle turning. A lot of chips will be flying and hopefully a lot of fun had.

March – Shop Tours and first quarter challenge.

April – I am hoping to line up a live goblet making demo possible with a captive ring thrown in.

May – I am planning a club discussion on finishes as a follow up to Mark Palma's presentation last year.


Ornaments made from 2x4 scrap, acrylic paint and faux fur



Segmented Desk lamp. Poplar with Mahogany base and accent ring. 5" d x 9.5" t (11" until I crushed it!) Wall thickness .020" – 0.040" hollowed to $\sim 1/16$ " and then sanded to final opacity. Pictures on lathe show light inserted into turning to sanding to final thickness and opacity


