

How did you get involved with the club's AV committee?

It was among those first meetings when I first came to the club that I got to talk with our then Vice President Bill King and we talked about my job. I work for Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) in the AV support department for the classrooms. At that time, the board was looking to update the AV system for the club, so they wanted to pick my brain a little. They were wanting to move from our old analog system to new larger displays with high-definition video. I enjoy working with technology and was happy to help. Not long after we finally got that system installed and mostly working, Covid hit and we had to switch to Zoom club meetings. I had worked with Zoom for several years at VCU by this point, so I was able to help the board navigate that adventure. Now that we are back to doing live inperson, we're working on a new system that will help improve our experience for live demos whether you are in the room or if you need to join by Zoom. That process has been a little slow going for me between work and my 3-year-old son occupying much of my time these days, but we're getting close. It's been really fun working through the challenges associated with this system. Though I work with technology every day, there are so many different ways to do things, its been a fun challenge to find the right combination of functionality, form, and reasonable pricing.

How long have you been a woodturner?

I was first introduced to woodturning by a former RWT club member and member of my church, Jack Hayes. He invited me out to his shop and helped me turn my first mallet around 2013 and I was hooked. He graciously let me come back over several more times until I eventually got my first lathe, a Nova Comet II in 2015.

He did a great job breaking down his approach to quickly clearing waste wood and invited volunteers to come up and give it a try. I raised my hand and the room erupted with encouragement for the new turner to try. The hands-on learning and open dialog between experienced and new turners that first meeting was what kept me coming back month after month.

What is your favorite aspect of woodturning?

There are so many check boxes that woodturning checks off for me. I work in a technology intense field and I need a creative outlet to unwind. There is just something relaxing about making shavings. I enjoy making things for others that are unique or special. It's so much fun to come across a piece of a tree that was significant to someone and give them a bowl or a pen from that tree that will last beyond the tree. I also enjoy tools and learning how to use different ones. Since this is a hobby for me, I don't have a huge budget for my tools, so I end up spending a lot of time researching different tools looking at all of the features and capabilities, so when I save up enough, I know exactly what I'm looking for. The search is a part of the fun. When I finally find a deal on something I've been looking for, bringing it home feels almost like it felt to open presents on Christmas morning when I was a kid.

Questions/Answers

<u>QUESTION-</u> Should I buy a CBN grinding wheel? If so, what grit.

ANSWER-

My opinion - yes. Though expensive at first, it will last nearly a life time and will extend the life of your turning tools. As to what grit, opinions will vary, but I have a 180 grit which I'm pleased with. It gives a sharp edge with one pass. You will need a coarser wheel, something like a 60-80 grit if you need to reshape a profile. White frangible wheels that come with most grinders are good for this. Never use coarse grey wheels on cutting tools.
