Multi-Axis Turning by Barbara Dill

Multi-axis is the only turning we can do that is not symmetrical.

There are two basic types: twisted and parallel. The combination of the two types leads to infinite possibilities. Trying to predict the finished product or to duplicate it is where the real fun begins.

Barbara Dill is back turning after a break to handle family matters and build a new shop. She had a chance to see Mark Sfirri do his multi-axis magic and was bitten by the bug. She uses a safety stud center to reduce breaking objects from catches, starts with heavy tools sharpened to 30° to reduce vibration and a high speed to reduce air time.

Since half the time you will have air, Barbara uses a bright light and a dark background to locate the wood's edge. She recommends fine grained wood, pre-punching spindle axis holes, sanding before changing axis and rasping those tight areas where sanding isn't possible.

For the <u>twisted axis</u>, Barbara likes to draw a triangle on each end of the wood and number the corners. Rough it to round, then change the axis to 1 on the tail stock & 2 on the headstock, then 2 & 3, etc. until three different axes have been turned.

Quick Tips

Capture Rings for Beginners by Phil

Cut big deep beads. Using the pointy tip, stick the skew into the side of the bead. Twist it until it's about half way through the wood. Do it again from the other side. When the bead is released, wrap sandpaper around the stem and use it to sand the inside of the ring. Clean up the stem. If you can draw a pentagon, you may want to try to multi-axis turn it.

For the <u>parallel axis</u>, the turning points are in a straight line going through the center. Barbara turned a cove-bead–cove on one axis, and then changed the axis for the bead–cove–bead. Be sure to reverse the turning order or you will be starting over. Also, keep the tool tip high, the bevel in contact with the wood and your tool rest smooth.

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2006 EOG Grant

WOODTURNERS ANONYMOUS OF RICHMOND (VA)

The AAW grant will assist in expanding the partnership initiated in 2005 between the Woodturners Anonymous of Richmond (Richmond Woodturners) and the Spotsylvania County VA 4-H clubs, a youth development program of the Virginia Cooperative Extension Service. Funds will be used to purchase 2 lathe stations and related safety equipment to be used for summer camp and other 4-H events throughout the year. The expanded program will make it possible for 4-H campers to have handson woodturning experience. Similar learning opportunities will be offered to 4-H counselors and volunteers interested in learning to turn wood.

Association with the 4-H program and the Virginia Cooperative Extension Service is helping the Richmond Woodturners Chapter develop relationships with Virginia Tech (schools of Forestry and Wood Science) and the Virginia Department of Forestry.

These relationships are beneficial because they provide educational and training opportunities, the

Cindy's Demo by Guy Cox

On Memorial Day, 30 or so turners and their spouses braved the Interstate highway traffic to learn Cindy's Drozda's technique and philosophy of turning finial boxes. Cindy start out with a PowerPoint TM presentation of some of her work and her studio and its beautiful surroundings in Bolder Colorado. Cindy them quickly moved into wood selection and the specially ground tools she uses to create her boxes. All of these tools grinds were her original designs or grinds used by others modified in the extreme to meet Cindy's needs and turning technique. From what she has learned about tools design, she could write a book on turning tool design. Cindy then covered mounting the wood onto the lathe for box turning. Cindy started the box by parting off the bottom and turning the top with the integral finial from the remaining stock. She worked from apex to the base of the finial never going backwards towards the tailstock. One of the tips she gave on turning the beads was that you should be able to see light at the bottom of the bead.

When Cindy began to hollow the box bottom from the end grain of holly she was using for the demonstration, it became obvious that she could write the book on tool sharpening as well as turning finial boxes; long white ribbons came streaming out of the end of the box – If I hadn't know better I would have thought that she had mounted a big block of Ivory soap . She then inset the inlay and finished fitting the top into the recess in the box bottom. Adjust the fit of the box top according to the needs of the anticipated use and user of the box Cindy told us. She then jam chucked the bottom, added tape for insurance and finished off the bottom of the box base.

Thanks go to Ray Deyo who was kind enough to open up the Richmond Woodcraft store on the holiday morning to host the demonstration. It was a great two hours and I hope Cindy caught her flight home.
