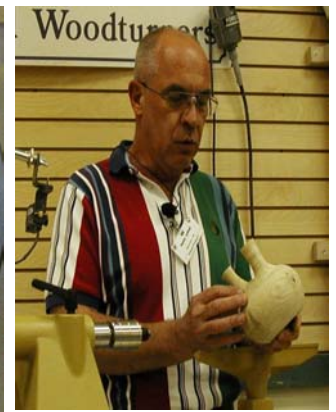
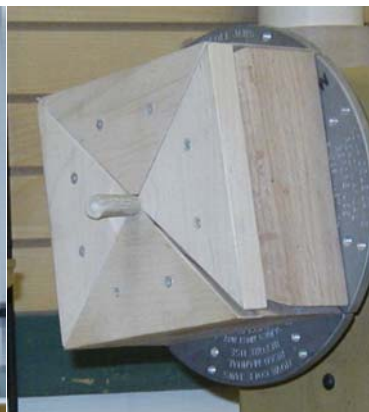

Taking It to the Next Step with Dan Luttrell

It's time to think beyond the basics of gouge, skew and parting tools. "How would you turn a wooden bong or nuts or bent things?" Jigs are our friends. With help from Tom Crab, Dan got the idea to turn the columns of the bong separate using multi-axis experience. Then glue them on and hide the glue lines with fancy trimmings. (If you make it, someone will buy it.) Need to turn something with a bend in it (like antler for letter openers) – make a hollow jig and attach it to your Cole jaws.

NUTS are Dan's thing. He suggests that you keep good notes on the developmental process and don't lose them. (Sometimes the most important tool in the workshop can be a file cabinet.) Start small as there is less wood to waste and check through those chips before you compost any of your tools. (It takes them forever to compost but only a day to rust.) OK back to the nut. (See Nuts on P2)



Phil English & 4-H

June 17 was train the 4-H Summer Camp Volunteers at Phil's workshop in Thornburg. He borrowed (from Ray) and the club bought two mini-Jet lathes so each person had one. Being total beginners, instruction emphasized safety and only 3 tools (roughing gouge, bowl gouge, parting tool). Each volunteer had someone watching them to keep them from causing too much self-inflicted damage (Phil believes in the blood-letting teaching method). The seven novices (including Dr. Kathleen Jamison from Tech) turned a rolling pin and a small bowl. Phil was at his best passing out coffee and donuts. (See 4H on P2)

Quick Tips

Mounting Big Hunks of Wood Drill a shallow hole into the blank the size of your spindle. Mount the blank on the lathe with the hole toward the headstock. Turn it as fast as your lathe will allow without it dancing. If the vibrations shake the blank loose, the spindle in the hole will still hold onto the wood long enough for you to shut it down.

(NUTS:) Turn the basic nut shape and leave the tendons. Mark the center line and band saw the nut 1/4 inch off center. A sled will help with this process. Use dividers to find the center of half a nut and transfer the center from one half to the other side.

Mounting the nut is next. Drill a small hole 90° at the center. Mount the nut to a centering jig with a pin in the hole (no glue). This will hold the nut in the proper location for CA gluing the outside of the nut to the face plate. Glue 8 outrigger dowels to the nut and faceplate for extra support. Face off the piece and make a spigot on one half and a socket on the other half. Afterwards stick the halves back together and blend the ends and edges. At this point 60 grit sandpaper is your best friend. Dan used a power carver to shape and texture the nut later. Ray sells them at the store.

P-nut's basic shape is multi-axis turning with 2 cavities. It is mounted 6 different times.

Almond's basic shape is 2 bowls connect together.

In all cases, love that CA glue and 60 grit.
