Turning Nemo by Sid Mace

Sid has this thing for fishy stuff. Could it be because he lives near the water? According to him, making the chucks to hold the fish wood is the hardest part.

Chucks: He used 3/4 x 1 1/2 inch wood, so 2 pieces makes 1 1/2 square. You will need 2 chucks (head & tail). & 2" square blocks of wood; drill a 1 1/2" hole, square up the sides of the hole. Mount them; turn them round to fit into some PVC pipe sections. PVC will protect the chucks from nicks and makes them last longer.

- 1. Mount the **two fish** wood into the chucks; you want a tight fit (use sandpaper shims to achieve this fit). Round up the stock. The head & tail's small diameter = radius +1/4" or 1 inch for the demo. Any smaller and you might be making flying fish.
- 2. Switch so the turned parts now face inwards. Make it round again.
- 3. Cut in the tail & nose; be sure they line up with the other cuts. You're finished when the sides come together & the fishes back/belly edges are sharp.
- 4. Drill the eyes before cutting off the square ends. Cut out the tail and flatten it on the belt sander.
- 5. **Four fish** wood still equals a square, but the small diameter equals the diagonal + 3/16" or for the demo 1 1/4". Turn it round and cut in for the tail & nose.
- 6. Mark the inside ends of the blocks and turn them so all the marks are on the outside. Finish turning. Drill the eyes with help from a V-block. Bandsaw the tails & flatten them with a belt sander. [Continued page2]

- 7. **Two Squirts** (look like flat worms to me) are made the same way. Rough it out and make a long taper tail on one end (Radius or less if you're feeling lucky).
- 8. Reverse the wood. Round it up and make a long tapered tail on the other end.

9. These are called inside/out turnings and as Barbara Dill so excitedly said they are also multi-axis turnings.

OK, Sid, the challenge has been made. We want Squids next or maybe a big fish wearing one of your wooden cowboy hats.

GAW ANNUAL SYMPOSIUM Sept 14-16, 2007

The Georgia Association of Woodturners (GAW) will be presenting its annual symposium, Turning Southern Style XIII. This years event will again be held at the Unicoi State Park and Lodge near Helen, GA. This years featured turners include: **Stuart Mortimer** lives in England with his wife. He is a retired police inspector who became a proficient hobby turner before his retirement in 1989. Stuart is a self taught turner, winner of many national awards and has built up an international reputation. He is a writer, teacher, and demonstrator. His work is hand crafted on and off a lathe using hand held electrical powered tools as well as traditional carving tools. He started spiral work in the mid 1980 to decorate a wide range of work from twisted miniature goblets, candle sticks, bowls, boxes, hollow forms, artistic and other decorative works. *Michael Mocho* lives in New Mexico. He is a professional woodworker and instructor with over 30 years of experience in contract turning, furniture making, carving, millwork, sculpture, prototype development, and stringed musical instruments. He is known for his intricate containers that often combine bent wood with turned components. Michael is a highly sought after teacher and demonstrator. He is the winner of many national awards and has participated in numerous juried and invitational exhibitions. Michael Hosaluk lives in Canada and is recognized as one of the world's most creative woodturners. In 2004, he was awarded the Saskatchewan Lieutenant Governor's Award for Innovation in the Arts. He is a member of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts and an Honorary Lifetime Member of the Saskatchewan Crafts Council. Michael was active on the Steering and Advisory Committees of the Furniture Society. Since 1982, he has been the coordinator of the biennial International Wood Furniture/Turning Conference. Michael work has been exhibited throughout Canada, the US, England, Germany and Japan. The **instant gallery** will return as a favorite and we invite each participant to display up to four pieces of his/her work for all to enjoy. As always, the vendor area will be well stocked with tools, wood, and all other woodturning related supplies and equipment. Saturday Night Dinner and Auction.
