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Making Your Own Tools with Myron Curtis & Rubin Everett

The evening started out with Rubin making rosettes with his hand made tools. Each one was crafted to do a part of the rosette fast & easy so he can crank them out. Rubin gets \$3 for each and makes a hundred of them each year to help support his tool making habit.

Every tool has three parts: steel, handle & ferrule.

Steel – M2 is the best to work. Old planer blades, drill blanks (round) or lathe tool bits (square or rectangular) all work fine. Steel should be 10+ inches & the tang 4+ inches and tapered.

Ferrule – compression brass nut used in plumbing

Handle – hardwood, persimmon turns nice.

First turn the handle from hardwood. The size, length and diameter that fit the steel needed and feels good to hold. Turn the wood round using a spur drive center. On the tail end turn a short dowel to the diameter of the nut. Turn a second dowel to the length of the threaded inside of the nut. At this time get the nut on the first dowel end. Reattach to the tail stock. Continue to cut the second dowel until the nut can be threaded onto the second dowel with the help of a wrench. Screw it on until it's snug against the shoulder. Wearing a face mask, turn the brass nut with a round nose chisel to get the "flats" off the nut. Nut is now the ferrule. Finish turning the handle. Sand & polish the handle and ferrule. Grind the steel. Myron made a drop nose-round scrapper. He likes a 55-60° angle for his work. Make what works for you. [Continued on page 2]

[Myron] He has used a 150 grit wheel that is just about gone and the grinding surface is rounded over, but he loves it.

Now, drill a hole dead center (1/32 larger than the square of the tang or same diameter as a round tang) and make it 4-5 inches deep. Saw off the end (first dowel). Drive the steel into the handle (may need help), check it for straightness, drive it some more, check it again & then finish driving it in to the wood handle. OK make a tool for next month. I want a capture ring tool, one tool did it all. I will discuss it with my spouse, the wanna-be-tool-maker.

AAW Youth Mentoring Woodturning Program

This program is being supported by the national organization of the AAW and is designed to be implemented by the local chapters. A Youth Turning Program has great potential and could fill the void of, lack of exposure to the craft and art of woodturning often not available to the youth today. The program will provide a foundation of woodturning for youth through education, information and organization leading to the enrichment of their young lives while expanding their minds and promoting self confidence. Ultimately our goal is to have the organization selected self supportive with all the needed equipment and training. By a directive of the AAW Directors I was asked to implement a Pilot Youth Mentoring Program. I presented this program to my fellow officers of Hands-On Woodturners, a local AAW chapter and they agreed to initiate a program. The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch organization was chosen and I contacted the Director of the Crafts Shop, Pete Peterson and outlined the AAW's mission to get our youth interested in this Woodturning Program. The next step was to visit the facility and give a demonstration to gauge the interest level of the boys. After a positive response was determined and the boys displayed an interest to learn and spend time behind the lathe, a schedule was set up by the Arts and Craft Instructor, Pete Peterson and the local AAW chapter President, Nicholas Di Mona and Tony Cortese, AAW Board Director. Once a schedule was in place, equipment and supplies needed became the main focus. The problem was soon remedied by informing the Instructor that money was available through the AAW in the form of an EOG (Educational Opportunity Grant). With the direction and help of the local chapter and AAW Director guiding the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch they were able to apply and receive funding for their basic woodturning equipment. It is our goal, depending on the number of volunteer mentors, to couple two boys with one instructor so that the boys are able to spend a maximum amount of time actually turning wood. Presently we have 5 boys per lathe and give four classes per day on a bi-monthly schedule. [Continued next column]

Volunteers do most of the work along with a small paid staff of conference coordinators. Please consider volunteering for couple of hours. You will get more back than you put in. We need help with Room Assistants, Youth classes, and Instant gallery.

ROOM ASSISTANT: provide assistance to the Demonstrator or Videographer as requested and cleanup after the session. New this year, we'll have a cadre of top notch videographers to operate the cameras so this will not be a Room Assistant duty. You do have to sit up front, please go to <http://hockenbery.net/volform.htm> And complete a web form that will be e-mailed automatically when you hit submit to Paul Rasmussen who is this years Volunteer Coordinator. Please hit submit only once as each time sends an e-mail.

YOUTH ASSISTANT: The Symposium will include a youth class room for 25 students. We will have 8 class sessions two of 3 hour length and 6 that are 90 to 110 minutes long. The instructors would like to have 10 to 12 assistant in each session. The duties correspond to the assistants experience and confidence. It can be as simple as calling the instructor to help a student that needs a little extra help to actually guiding the student directly. [AAW Youth] This is recommended in order to maintain a continuing interest and woodturning proficiency. Projects should be selected for the young turners enabling them to gain confidence and skill levels while experiencing the joy of accomplishment. A gauge of their progression might be measured in a multiple phase certificate program.

PHASE 1 CERTIFICATE should be awarded upon completion of the basic tools skill usage and safety awareness.

PHASE 2 CERTIFICATE "Beginners Projects" should be awarded upon completion of simple miscellaneous turnings, i.e. pens, tops, honey dippers, weed pots etc.

PHASE 3 CERTIFICATE "Intermediate Projects" should be awarded upon completion of more difficult projects, i.e. bowls, hollow forms, platters, lidded boxes etc.
