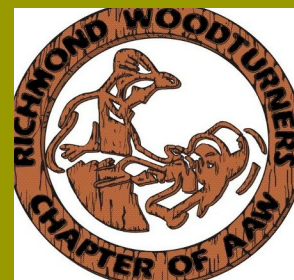

Basics II: Getting the Most Out of a Log

Another very good demo, this time on blank cutting. First thoughts on that large free fall tree: Can I get it home and on the lathe; are there any bark inclusion or cracks all the way through; am I going to turn it right way or seal the ends and store it for later?

Chain saw safety: wear chain saw chaps, helmet, face shield and ear protection. Before sawing check chain tension, oil reserve, check chain for sharpness and change bent bars (cuts in curves).

Burl Blanks: For safety, Mike cuts through the large bark inclusion as they might fly off the lathe later. Nice burl is mostly on the surface and just under the bark; burls are expensive; keep all this in mind when designing a bowl blank. Design the blank to use most of the burl, save the rest for bottle stoppers and other small things. Hollow forms save most of the burl. Turn a burl in a straight shot or it might warp. Chalk it up, wipe it off & do it again until you like the design.

Ambrosia patterns: don't necessarily go all the way through a trunk piece; pattern on the end cut often changes in the middle of the blank. Centered grain patterns must have the pith line through the middle of the blank. Figure is more important than size.

Drive center: drill a hole bigger than the spur through the bark. **[Continued on page 2]**

Leave wiggle room at head & tail stock for balancing. Do it by hand & slow speed. Mike starts all his with a spindle turning. After balancing the piece & the grain, he turns a tenon and remounts in a chuck.

March Meeting: Tools Use & Sharpening

INTRODUCTION

We'll present the main tools of our trade, how to use them and how to sharpen them. **The newsletter should invite members to bring tools they have trouble sharpening.** We'll have three sharpening stations set up in the side room. We'll cover these categories:

1. The bowl gouge The most common grinds (varieties of the Irish grind/Ellsworth grind) and the straight-across grind to deal with the transition area and bottom of deep bowls (and the alternative, a scraper). How to use it most effectively (roughing, slicing, scraping)--bowl blank will be provided, if desired. Sharpening (freehand, jigs).

2. Hollowing tools The various options (Ellsworth-type, Kelton, moveable tips, carbide 'wheel' cutters). Demonstrate use on an open blank--for better viewing (blank will be provided, shaped on the outside with a center 1" hole drilled--if desired). How to sharpen hollowing tools (demonstration on sharpening station next to lathe)

3. Tools for outside enhancement Making beads and grooves. Shaping the foot. Rough-turned blank provided, if desired (touched up, running even, ready for beads, grooves). How to sharpen the tool(s) on sharpening station next to lathe.

The one concern I have about the sharpening stations is that they'll distract from the presentations/demonstrations. On the positive side, people get to focus on what's most important to them, hands-on sharpening instruction or the up-front instruction.
