

When was the last time you assessed your turning skill; what you make and how you go about it? Have you ever walked up to the lathe wanting to turn but wished you could turn something different? Admittedly, I experience this occasionally and decided to do something about it. While attending the 2015 AAW Symposium last month, I set the objective to expand my skill into a new area (for me) in hopes of being able to create a different piece sometime in the future.

After studying the list of demonstrations available, I decided on carving. It's an embellishment that can be applied to any turning. It can be a brief accent or completely change the shape. Any wood can be carved with the right tools and it lends itself to considerable experimentation. In time, and a fair bit of practice, a new door will have opened.

I attended three demonstrations by Avelino Samuel from the Virgin Islands (that's a collective four and a half hours with one demonstrator). Throughout the sessions many questions were asked, photos taken, tips written down and diagrams drawn showing what not to do. Afterward, I went back to the instant gallery and took pictures of his finished pieces for future reference. And, during the trip home, the decision was made to give it a year of practice, to ruin a few pieces, punch through unintentionally, see how far I can go with a dull tool and (probably) heal from a cut or two. In the end, I will have ventured into another area of turning.

Before the Symposium, a fellow club member approached me about learning to turn hollow forms but wasn't sure how to go about it. He wants to change direction, strengthen his skill and produce something different, too. Then I thought about how popular the tops turning event was a few months ago. While the objective was to create tops, it was surprising how many of us just wanted to learn how to do it and the favorable comments about the session afterward. We seem to have a thirst as a group. If this is true, then I call upon each of you to let us (the Board) know what you want to learn, what demos we can arrange, what private sessions can be organized, etc. Demos don't have to be self contained, they can become a series, too. It sure would be nice to see more of us participating in Show and Tell each month.

Finally, thanks to Aage Rendalen for chairing the meeting last month and, in advance, to Jim Bumpas for taking the lead this month. Some plans were made before elections last November causing me to miss a couple meetings. My apologies to all.

And a special thought is sent to Aage who is attending his father's funeral this month in Norway. I am sure everyone joins me in expressing heart-felt sympathies for his loss.
