He uses the finest wood available, many times they are Austrailian exotics. But .the work of creating the metal top often exceeds the efforts of turning the wood. The remaining photos show the careful use of hollowing tools to achieve the very thin walls of the vessels and the process of creating the insert out of Blackwood for the cover to mate with for a perfect fit.

You too can achieve these results, all it takes is lots of Practice and the very careful use of very sharp tools!



Richmond Penturners - July

This month's meeting featured a presentation and demonstration of a low cost, low power laser for engraving pens and other small objects. The laser engraver complete with software is typically on sale from Gearbest.com from \$79 – \$95. Thanks to the computer geeks who helped make this run smoothly.



This engraver will engrave wood, paper, leather and some plastics and is particularly suited for putting names and small graphics on wooden pen barrels. Engraving area is limited to about 1.5" x 1.5". For added contrast, the engraved area can be colored using products such as Pro Color Fill, Rub-n-Buff, or Paint stick.

A Message from Trent Bosch:


