### **CLIFF GUARD TURNING FINIALS**



Our club was the beneficiary of an excellent demo on Finials, from our guest from the Norfolk Club. Cliff Guard was his name and finials his game!! Not only is he good at his craft he is also an excellent demo guy with a great sense of humor. Furthermore, he makes no bones about putting people in their place, including some famous finial forks.

The key to Cliff's finials and his demos are these factors;

•dry wood •straight grain - -no knots

• sharp tools -really sharp, or Scary sharp

• great lighting - -nothing beats sunlight

• concentration- - of the brain that is!

•Above all else, a plan, a drawing, a concept of what you are

attempting, and

• PROPORTIONALITY- - the finial must look proper when mounted on the piece.

What all that means is that you can not "wing it" and end up with a piece of work that is going to fit the piece you are working on and it is NOT going to look right. A whole bunch of woods need to be avoided, including those hardwoods with knots,

green wood, and soft or fuzzy words. Straight grained, very dry woods, and sharp tools are essential.

Some pieces, as Cliff,"drop over sometime" pointed out are of the wrong size base and yet are excellent for the fine end of the finial. What Cliff advocates is a glue-up of the base to have something that allows the work piece to be chucked up properly and which can be disposed of at the end. There are a number of glues we all know that will do the job, including; white and yellow glues, Epoxy, CA and Gorilla. Proper drying times must be observed.


As you will see in the photos there are a number of situations where Cliff uses his offhand to steady the wood on the lathe which decreases the vibration. Also, it may lead to you guiding the skew/other tool, or at the least, providing a stopping point.

## From Our President

We had the good fortune to spend half of the last month in Alaska, our 49<sup>th</sup> state. From cruising up the coast to taking trains and buses into the interior, we saw landscapes and wild life you only read about or see in a documentary. As one who works with wood, I couldn't help but notice the reduction in tree species as we traveled further north. When finally reaching Fairbanks, their forests were mostly limited to birches, spruce and pine. When in Denali National Park we even went above the tree line where there weren't any trees at all.

It made me think about our local wood availability. They don't have the walnut, cherry, ash, or the oaks. Nor do they have apple, peach, pear (two kinds) or all the others. Then I reflected on the Forest Project and the variety of turning opportunity we have had because of it. Could I have been taking what we have available for granted?

On the last day of our trip (that's 14 days without ever seeing nighttime even when retiring at 11:30pm and rising at 4:30 the next morning) we intentionally took the day to walk Fairbanks. That sounds tiring until you consider the entire state of Alaska has less population than the greater Richmond Area (eat your heat our Sara). And as to be expected we stopped in many gift shops.

The objective was to return with a special memento, maybe a carved whale bone, walrus tusk or mammoth tooth. After sticker shock subsided, I found a small but simple wooden mask with a much higher price tag. According to the consignment shop owner, apparently Eskimos value wood much higher because of its limited availability. Again, do I take our local woods for granted?

Shortly after returning home, I went to the shop and fired up the lathe as usual but stopped for a minute just to look at the piece being turned. I had been taking what we have for granted and typically would get more excited over wood from other regions rather than our own. Overall it was a great trip, one I recommend to everyone. But in the end, I became a better turner though greater appreciation of what we have available. No longer is it just a piece of cherry or walnut. Now it's a beautiful piece of cherry or walnut.



3rd Qtr: Turn something out of a tree branch less than 3" is diameter.

4<sup>th</sup> Qtr: Turn a mixed media piece (must be primarily wood but includes other media (i.e.: polymer clay, metal, glass, anything)

#### Jean-Francois Escoulen Ball-&-Socket Eccentric Chuck



One, never been used, still in its original box, Jean-Francois Escoulen eccentric chuck, V1. The chuck consists of a main body and three "balls" or inserts that have holes drilled through them. The balls are:

20 mm ball for items 7" long and up to 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inches in diameter 30 mm ball for items 7" long and up to 2 3/8 inches in diameter 40 mm ball for items 8" long and up to 3 1/8 inches in diameter Also included is a Stronghold adapter manufactured by OneWay to fit a 1 1/4 inch X 8 TPI drive

Original instructions, installation tools, and training tips are included. Purchased in approximately 1996.
