


Awards were given while setting up the display at the Glen Allen Cultural Arts Center. Note that all were practicing proper COVID protocols by wearing masks.

4th Quarter: - Child's toy, with kid safe parts and finish





Tips and Tricks

This is a new section in the newsletter. Members are invited to submit entries they think will help other members. If you are passing on something you have learned from someone else or read in a publication, giving credit is always appropriate.

REPEATABLE GRINDER SETTINGS

From Chuck Horton: I don't recall the source, but I didn't dream it up.

This only works for CBN grinding wheels. Friable* grinding wheels will change diameter over time. Build a jig on your grinder stand to establish a consistent tip exposure.




Make your preferred setting for the tool rest.



Measure and cut a piece of Masonite or plywood to tightly fit the gap as shown.



Mark it for future use.



Make one for each gouge grind.

*Friable: cutting crystals abrade to expose fresh cutting crystals.

Questions and Answers

Q: How do you keep from getting lint in the finish when using Wipe-On Polyurethane or friction polish?

A: Buy a roll of blue shop towels from any auto parts store for about \$5 and cut a sheet into small wipes. A roll will last for a long time. It will not shed lint.



Q: How do you sharpen a Forstner drill bit?

A: On-line, see Stumpy Nubs Woodworking Journal. He uses a file and a diamond card. Or see other on-line hints: search “how to sharpen a Forstner bit”. You will need a diamond card file and/or a fine file. There is one video using a Dremel type grinder, but unless you have great manual dexterity, you will ruin more bits than you sharpen.

Treasurers Report

In early 2020, we discovered that the IRS had no record of the Club's 501 (c) (3) status. Similarly, the Va. State Corporation Commission had no record of the Club's incorporation as a non-profit organization. Subsequently, we filed articles of incorporation with the Corporation Commission and filed an application for non-profit status with the IRS which was granted in June.

The Club's board also developed and adopted an aspirational budget for 2021 that is intended to provide guidance for targeted spending and to establish an equipment reserve fund should Club equipment (audio/visual, lathes, etc) require replacement or upgrading. In conjunction with establishing the budget, the Board recognized that membership dues were failing to cover typical recurring annual operating costs and decided to increase dues to a level that would cover such costs. The Board also decided to establish a PayPal account to give additional options for collecting dues and expending funds.

Finally, Dan Luttrell is spearheading a fund-raising effort to increase the Club's reserves. The donations collected thus far have greatly improved our financial status.
