I became Vice President of RWT in January 2020 following in the footsteps of my predecessor Jim Bumpass. About 2 months into my tenure COVID hit and

Notes from Penturners

The next meeting of the Penturner's club will be March 9 at Woodcraft. We will be discussing approaches to modifying Slimline kits and will have a demo on how to do a hidden clip. As always, we will start the meeting with showing off your pens. If you have a modified slimline, please bring it and be prepared to discuss your approach. Cody Walker will be doing a pen turning demonstration at Woodcraft on February 25, 2023 **February Program**

 2×4 turning marathon – We will set up as many lathes as possible and everyone in attendance will have the opportunity to create something. 

Tips and Tricks

From Chuck Bajnai

"In January's Show and Tell, I presented a wood pen that was finished with Magic Juice, from Turners Warehouse (\$35 for the (6) one-ounce bottles). It is a 6-part CA finishing compound that worked as well or better than the nine step micromesh. 1. Finish pen with CA like normal, 2. Sand to 1200 3. Apply the 6 finishes of Magic Juice (after bottle 1, the finish is already near the 8000 micromesh) 4. Buff if you feel the need.

I am a convert because it is faster and less risky than micromesh. I got better results on the ends of each blank.
