Virginia Woodturner's Symposium


On even numbered years, the woodturning clubs of Virginia collaborate to provide a woodturning symposium. It will be held in Fishersville, VA on November 2 and 3 (Saturday and Sunday). There will be four 1 1/2 hour demos on Saturday and three on Sunday, for an advanced reservation fee of \$85. Each day there will be a choice of 7 demos in each time frame. This is a real bargain.

A top notch selection of demonstrators has already been arranged on an interesting variety of topics. However, such an event requires participation by club members in addition to just attending. People are needed to assist with A/V, registration, assisting vendor and demo station setup on Friday, and a myriad of other details. Equipment needs to be picked up and transported both before and after the event.

The Richmond Woodturners has named two delegates to the Symposium Committee to work toward producing a successful event. They are Walt Bennett and Bob Silkensen. I was looking for a new 3/4" 3TPI blade for my bandsaw when I stumbled onto a discussion about sharpening them. The first techniques were time consuming and difficult to do uniformly. Then I came across a jig similar to the one shown in the photo from finewoodworking.com, Click Here for link or go to https://www.finewoodworking.com/2022/11/23/cleverjig-sharpens-bandsaw-blades-in-place. The blade is sharpened while on the saw, takes less than 10 min once set up, and results in the blade cutting almost like new and tracks well. Blade needs to have uniform tooth spacing and best for 3-4 TPI.

À small weight keeps the jig in contact with the blade as it is slowly rotated backward. Key adjustments are the distance from the blade so grinding wheel is parallel to back edge of the tooth and the vertical location and the length of registration pin. The pin is set so grinding wheel barely touches tooth to be sharpened and comes off tooth being sharpened before registration pin comes off its tooth.

I'll bring it to the meeting if you are interested in seeing it.

300 Year Old Elm Stump



After some sanding, Carrie Russell has obtained a 62" diameter glass top for the stump of the 300 year old Elm that she had to have removed. Some of you are familiar with this historical tree. The glass top covers most of the stump and looks very nice. She has ingeniously supported it with wine bottle corks which absorb the variation in flatness and provide an air space which should keep the surface free of mold. It is checking as you may expect. She is interested in continuing sanding (in stages) and coating/sealing the top surface in order to preserve it as long as possible. Of course, it is end grain, exposed to the elements and may continue to draw moisture from the ground. *The question is*, what is the best surface treatment for this? Your expert opinion is requested. Remember, she will probably sand the surface, again and again, after applying sealer coats, as she is able, and wants the grain to remain visible. Dan Luttrell

I recently upgraded my laser pointer system in 2 ways. My problem has always been an inaccurate and intermittent laser beam due to vibration. I glued 2 pieces of wood together so that the laser could be offset to 90° above the carving tip. I drilled one hole to fit the boring bar and another to fit the laser holding bar. I bought 2 threaded inserts and thumb screws to lock onto the bars.

The second thing I did was to bore out the laser holder to fit a larger diameter and stronger laser pointer. Now everything is steady as a rock with a sharp bright point

INFORMATION FOR POWERMATIC 3025C OWNERS by John Daniel If you hear a squeak developing in your 3025C, check the belt. You may see it getting slightly frayed on one side - most likely the right side. If you find this, take a short stiff ruler and put it on the sides of the top and bottom pulley at the same time. If there is a gap, you need to adjust your pulley. START with the bottom. Look for a gap between the left side of the pulley and a shoulder on the shaft to the left. If you don't see a space, you are good there. If you do, move the bottom pulley TO THE LEFT against the shoulder in the shaft. To move it, loosen the set screw, tap the pulley tight against the shoulder and lock the set screw. (See note at the end of this regarding the set screws). Once the bottom pulley is in place, loosen the two set screws in the top pulley and tap it to the right or left to bring top and bottom pulleys into alignment and parallel. Once they are aligned, tighten the two set screws. Your squeak should be gone and the motor should (possibly) run smoother. Having just had this problem, Powermatic sent a tech to my shop because this is a fairly rare occurrence. REGARDING the set screws: The set screws are "pre-treated with a lock tight type material." You will notice a slight blue residue on them. When you put the screws back in lock them down. Check the key behind the set screw on the top and make sure the screw is hitting that "flat". Once all set screws are tight you are finished. THIS SHOULD BE A THING TO CHECK ON YOUR DURING YOUR REGULAR MAINTENANCE ROUTINE. Enjoy a wonderful beast: Powermatic 3025c.
