

#### Wooden Frisbee



This was made in 2015 for a Richmond Woodturners summer picnic challenge. I don't know who came up with the idea, but it was an interesting challenge to turn and it flies pretty well. The picnic was held at Aage Rendalen's house in Glen Allen. It was in moderately large back

yard. The idea was to see whose frisbee would fly the furthest. Mine placed about the middle of the pack. I concluded that the power of the thrower's arm had more to do with the distance traveled than the design of the frisbee. Several ended up two back yards over, and some in neighbor back yards on the next street over. (Their

back yards abutted Aage's.) Alas, Aage isn't with us anymore. He passed due to cancer not many years after the picnic. He was a skilled and creative turner and board member, who demonstrated for the club several times.

As to the pictured frisbee, I don't remember exactly how I turned it. I recently



drafted a step-by-step sequence and attempted a second one. However, I had large chunks of the rim chip out when I started hollowing it and have abandoned the effort for now. I don't remember at all how I did the undercutting on the rim. I tried several approaches and none were satisfactory. If someone has a suggestion, I'd like to hear it.






Cherry footed vessel that is 7" tall and 4" in diameter. The finish is wipe on poly.

There will be four 1 1/2 hour demos on Saturday and three on Sunday, for an advanced reservation fee of \$85. Each day there will be a choice of 7 demos in each time frame. This is a real bargain.

Klingspor and Penn State discount programs

Tips and Tricks

Steve Kellner is going to discuss "Turning your bandsaw" at the Turners Talk at the August meeting. One to the topics will be blade tension.

Measuring Bandsaw Blade Tension Excerpt from Solowoodworker.com

If you are like me, you normally tension your blade by feel and, if you use the same size blade and it cuts well, you're good; but if you change blade size, that feel might not work.

Determining tension is not difficult if you have an inexpensive dial indicator. You just measure elongation (amount of stretch) and back-calculate tension which is easier than it sounds. Using the Stress/Strain equation: **Elongation or strain (L)** 

= Stress (tension) / E (Young's modulus ~30,000,000 for steel).

For 30,000 tension, L=30,000/30,000,000=0.001" per in. If we measure over 10", L=0.01" for 30,000 psi tension or .001 / 3000 psi tension. Blade tension is typically  $\sim 20,000$  psi which is .007 " elongation. The jig for measuring is shown here (10" between clamps). Steve will demonstrate this as part of his Turner's Talk during this month's meeting.
