

"The Confused Plumber"



Many years ago, when attending my third AAW symposium, I saw two pieces of wooden pipe joined as an art piece in the instant gallery. The idea immediately drew my attention because it presented the opportunity to create something entirely different. Over the years, I mentally designed various pieces and ultimately built what was to be known as the "Plumber's Nightmare". After selling it to an art collector, I committed to making another pipe sculpture for myself. Like so many other turners, there were already various pieces on display at home, so it had to be something useful. Why not a lamp? And the idea of the "Confused Plumber" was born.

The base of this lamp needed to set the tone for strength and overall dimension. In addition to the 24 wood pieces making up the base, each

of the four corners has a 1 1/4" long internal steel tube turned to the correct diameter and drilled for the wire to provide stabilizing weight. Otherwise, the lamp could have become top heavy. Wooden feet were then added for eventual leveling.





Strength throughout the piece was also a concern requiring three different approaches to joining pieces together based on location and function. Either flush ends were butted together requiring an internal sleeve for glue strength or they were coupled together with mortise and tenon construction. Some joints required a turned sleeve which accepted tenons from each side, but this third piece had to anticipate not only combined tenon length, but tenon diameter, especially when

Design of the lamp occurred throughout the building process. As sections of height were added, intentionally unused pipe openings remained for connecting to the next section. To develop a mental image, the lamp was turned, so that an anticipated view from each of the four

two different pipe diameters were being joined.

could be envisioned. Once conceptualized, new pipes were made to accommodate the intended design requiring the shape, length and number of openings on each to be determined as needed. This necessitated many prototypes and the lamp cord fed through pipes as the lamp was built. From the beginning an articulating arm at the top of the lamp was planned and several prototypes were made. However, when the final piece had been completed and installed, it didn't compliment the lamp and was replaced with a different cap. Overall, through prototypes and redesign, 40% more pipes were actually made than used in the finished product.

When completed, the 48 feet of pipes were made from 29 species of wood encompassing 1132 pieces, 35 of which are internal and not visible. Total construction time was well over one year. There are ten non-functioning valves with handles that turn – each valve having five separately turned parts. Individual pipe sections were finished prior to assembly with glue joints protected. All joints are assembled with wood glue for longevity – no "CA" glue was used. In the construction there is one "Y" pipe – the most difficult piece to make. It required two prototypes and, with a finished diameter of 7/8" and length of 3", it ultimately required a starting piece of wood 5"x7"x3" because of the many alternative mounting requirements.



Finding a lamp shade to dress but not overpower the sculpture was more difficult than anticipated. It had to compliment with color, be unobscure in shape and aim the light downward to expose the intricacy of design. After many trials and errors, the perfect one was located in a big box store. Who would have figured? And, when I thought the project was complete, it needed a small pipe to hold the shade in place – two more pieces.

If the project proved one thing, it isn't always about what is mounted. It can also be about how it is mounted. Yes, another "Plumber" is in design.



Wig Stand: Sycamore from Barry and Leigh. 6" base, 5" top, 14" tall. Finish is water-based acrylic. I'm calling this my 'organic form' wig stand. Was going to be a tree but looks more like a toad stool! Four coats of finish, sanding with 320 grit between coats.



The top is 20" tall and 11" in diameter, the crown is made of Spalted Maple, the Shoulder is made of Black Walnut, the Body (disk) is made from Spalted Elm with a top and bottom transition piece made of Spalted Maple and the top is tuned black Walnut. The display stand is made of Birdseye Maple with a black Walnut body holder. The Top does spin but was created to more of sculptural piece of wood art, not a functional piece of craft. This is version one of what I hope to turn a few more times with more unique woods



Klingspor and Penn State discount programs

Chapel Hill Woodturners conduct instructional workshops by well known professional turners. They are located in Chapel Hill, NC, about 160 miles from Richmond. Their website is chwt.org where you can view their calendar of classes and sign up for notifications.

Tips and Tricks

How to sand to a superior finish.

I sand at 200-300 RPM (very slow). Sanding at low speed gives the grit more opportunity to work than it does at high speed. Since the sandpaper is more efficient at low speed, it means that I am actually getting my sanding done faster and without burned fingers or getting heat checks (small cracks).

My preference is to sand to a glossy finish. When the wood is glossy, most of the finish stays on the surface. If you use a wipe on, finish you will need less coats to get a great glowing shine. You must sand out all scuffs and imperfections with coarse sandpaper before proceeding through to 200 grit. I follow this with 300, 400, 600 & 800 Rhino Soft foam backed pads. This doesn't take long since I use these for only 30-60 seconds each. Now, finish with 1200 grit but turn up the speed to medium fast (800-1000 RPM). This last step burnishes the wood and you will see the wood become shinier as you sand. You will see a big difference if you just turn up the speed to burnish with whatever you are using for your final grit or with a hand full of saw dust.
