

**I used a little artistic license when turning my 'organic'
Eastern Red Cedar Wig
Stands, both finished with water-based acrylic with chip carving on spindles. The first is my 'Mushroom' wig stand, 6" diameter x 12" tall. The base pedestal is heavier than normal because I did not want to turn away the void. The second is my 'Palm tree' wig stand, 6" diameter x 16" tall with a pleasing crown shape and flowing structure, at least in my eye!

The ends are oak and the stem is cherry. I used a multi-axis turning technique, three twisted axis's to shape the stem. It was turned in one piece between centers. I will use water based spray polycrylic for the finish after finish sanding and touchup.



I purchased a used bowling ball for \$5 (it had 4 holes???). I cut it in half (to preserve the 3 holes) with my bandsaw. The core was a composite of 4 eccentric materials, including a pulverized limestone inner core. Turned the inside with carbide cutter.Polished with micro-mesh sanding blocks and buffing wheels.

It is a cherry footed bowl with three Pewa repairs. The finish is Danish oil.

During my demo in November, I forgot to mention some important things to consider when turning a yarn bowl from green wood. They are as follows:

- 1. Allow the bowl to dry before cutting the slot. Go ahead and drill the hole and do any sanding needed but wait to cut the slot until the bowl is dry.
- 2. I will leave the bottom slightly thicker and remount the bowl on the lathe and true up and finish turn the bottom after it has dried.
