The bowl: Elm, a practice for gouge skill. 4" deep, 7" wide. Finish is Tried/True Original. Vase: Osage, 8" high, 31/2 wide. Finish Tried/True Original, inside coated with Total Boat epoxy to be water proof.

I made this for our church Pastor who is from Ghana Africa. It is made out of a 150-year-old red Oak floor joist that was recovered from a renovation of the church. The turned part is in the oval stool support. I turned the piece of Oak into a circle, cut the center out, cut it in half, and joined the two half pieces using the straight timbers. I finished it in Shellac to preserve the wood color. It is a miniature version of the stool measuring 15x8x13 inches.

Background: What does the stool symbolize in Ghana? It is the traditional symbol of the authority of the king or chief. It is a unifying force which binds the state together as an entity composed of individuals, families, clans, and ethnic groups.

Soap on Wood?

I was recently looking for something to turn and was reviewing a collection of article excerpts, when I ran across one from Ron Kent. Ron has since passed on, but he was a well-known woodturner from Hawaii. He specialized mostly in Norfolk Island Pine, but was known for other work as well. He pioneered a method of soaking rough turned green wood pieces in a mixture of detergent and water, sometimes with other additives. I decided to try it with a small hollow form made of dead dogwood. That is, the wood was from a tree that had died before being cut down. It was a section had been laying outside my shop for a few months. Thus, damp at least and somewhat deteriorated.

I rough turned a hollow form about 8" high and with a wall thickness ½" or so, and generously coated inside and out it with a solution of 1 part clear laundry detergent and about 3 parts water. I then wrapped it in a plastic grocery bag to prevent drying out. A day or so later I did it again. After a 3 rd soaking a day or two later, I mounted and finished turned it. It sanded well. The surface was smooth, there was little tear out and I put a first coat of wipe on poly on it today, after drying for a couple of days. So far, so good. A re-review of Ron Kent's article disclosed that he also used this method on dry wood as well, with good results. The article can be found on the AAW website; search Ron Kent in the "author" box and you should be led to the article called "Soapy Bowls" in the spring 2002 edition of American Woodturner, PP 47-49.
